Contributions to the Camp Nebagamon Scholarship Fund support tuition scholarships at non-profit summer camps for children and teens who experience poverty and disability. Recipient camps offer specialized recreation and supports that cultivate skills and values needed for success, and are primarily located near cities where Nebagamon campers and alumni live.

Founded in 1947 by Muggs and Janet Lorber and administered by Nardie and Sally Lorber Stein for 50+ years, the fund is a growing force for good among Nebagamon alumni and friends.

<u>Camp Bovey</u> Gordon, WI – serves Minneapolis-St Paul region <i>East Side Neighborhood Service, Inc.</i>	70% from economically and disadvantaged backgrounds 5% have intellectual and physical challenges	Offers therapeutic recreation and creative arts supports children who have experienced trauma; cultivates leadership, character, teamwork, positive relationships, planning and problem-solving skills.
<u>Camp Courageous</u> Monticello, IA	100% have intellectual and physical challenges and 90% from economically disadvantaged backgrounds	Provides adaptive supported recreational, social and adventure experiences among peers for individuals with brain injury, ADHD, reduced vision, intellectual and physical disabilities.
<u>Camp of Dreams</u> Chicago – serves Chicago region	100% from economically disadvantaged backgrounds	Develops character, communication, civic engagement, care for self and community, cultural awareness, and college/career readiness.
<u>The Fowler Center</u> Mayville, MI	100% have intellectual and physical challenges and 55% receive public assistance	Offers accessible recreation that strengthens independent living and social functioning. Serves individuals on the autism spectrum, with brain injury, reduced hearing and vision, who require feeding tubes, special diets or catheters.
<u>Camp Helen Brachman</u> Almond, WI – serves Milwaukee region <i>COA Youth & Family Centers</i>	95% from economically disadvantaged backgrounds	Provides recreation plus supports to strengthen literacy development, relationship skills and anger management.
<u>Camp Joy</u> Clarksville, OH – serves Cincinnati region <i>United Way of Greater Cincinnati</i> <i>United Way of Warren County</i> <i>United Way of Clinton County</i>	99% from economically disadvantaged backgrounds, and 25% have intellectual and physical challenges	Overnight camp cultivates skills such as teamwork, setting and achieving goals, and developing healthy relationships. Inclusive day camp for children with disabilities offers adapted activities to support personal growth, self-confidence and self-esteem.
<u>Camp Phoenix</u> Sardis Lake, MS – serves Memphis region <i>Boys & Girls Clubs of Greater Memphis</i>	95% from economically disadvantaged backgrounds	Reinforces year-round Boys & Girls Club programs supporting positive educational and professional outcomes. Counselors from similar life circumstances are screened and trained to serve as good role models.
<u>Camp Red Leaf</u> Round Lake, IL – serves Chicago region <i>Jewish Council for Youth Services</i>	100% have intellectual and physical disabilities, and 45% from economically disadvantaged backgrounds	Offers adaptive accessible recreation and supports such as art and music therapy. Serves campers with challenges in self-care, learning, language, mobility and self-direction. Counselors are trained to nurture independence, friendship, achievement and positive behaviors.

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<p><u>Camp Wawbeek</u> Wisconsin Dells, WI – serves children primarily from Wisconsin plus surrounding states <i>Easter Seal Society of Wisconsin</i></p>	<p>100% have intellectual and physical disabilities, and 30% from economically disadvantaged backgrounds</p>	<p>Offers adaptive accessible recreation, and focuses on helping individuals overcome challenges. Counselors are trained to meet individual needs with personal care, emotional, behavioral and social support.</p>
<p><u>Happy Hollow Camp</u> Nashville, IN – serves Indianapolis region <i>United Way of Central Indiana</i></p>	<p>95% from economically disadvantaged backgrounds, and 5% have intellectual and physical disabilities</p>	<p>Develops problem-solving skills, self-sufficiency, teamwork, leadership and decision-making capabilities. Challenges children to transfer skills learned at camp to everyday life. Counselors are trained to support campers' positive behaviors and social skills.</p>
<p><u>Sherwood Forest Camp</u> Lesterville, MO – serves St Louis region <i>United Way of Greater St Louis</i></p>	<p>80% from economically disadvantaged backgrounds, and 25% have intellectual and physical disabilities</p>	<p>Provides an active learning environment that reinforces healthy risk-taking, problem-solving, teamwork, and character development. Strengthens reading proficiency and school readiness. 40% to 60% of staff are alumni and role models for breaking the cycle of poverty.</p>
<p><u>Voyageur Environmental Center</u> Mound, MN – serves Minneapolis-St Paul region <i>Boys & Girls Club of Minneapolis</i></p>	<p>85% from economically disadvantaged backgrounds</p>	<p>Provides supportive recreational program for children living in poverty and reinforces year-round Boys & Girls Club skill and character development initiatives. Counselors receive training and coaching to support needs.</p>
<p><u>Wyman Teen Leadership Program</u> Eureka, MO – serves St Louis region <i>Kiwanis Clubs of St Louis</i></p>	<p>100% from economically disadvantaged backgrounds</p>	<p>Provides a summer program that's integrated into five-year progressive program to support, inspire and prepare teens for college and adulthood. Counselors are trained in adolescent needs and behavior management.</p>

Staff receives training in behavior management, developmental stages, bullying prevention, and skills for supporting children with autism, ADD/ADHD and fetal alcohol syndrome.</p> <p>Superior YMCA Day Camp partners with Mentor Superior to give children a positive influence during the summer and offers a traditional outdoor recreation and fun, skills and values development.</p>
