The Camp Nebagamon Scholarship Fund helps children and teens who experience poverty and disability attend non-profit summer camps that specialize in meeting their needs. Donations support tuition scholarships at camps where children are among peers and role models for success as they enjoy friendship, adventure and personal growth — opening new possibilities for a more positive future.

CNSF was founded in 1947 by Muggs and Janet Lorber, Nebagamon’s founding directors, and administered for 50+ years by Nebagamon’s former directors, Nardie and Sally Lorber Stein.

Serves kids on the autism spectrum, who have brain injury, reduced hearing and vision, and/or require feeding tubes, special diets or catheters.

<a href="#"><u>Camp Wawbeek</u></a> Wisconsin Dells, WI – serves children primarily from Wisconsin plus surrounding states <i>Easter Seal Society of Wisconsin</i>	99% have intellectual and physical disabilities, and 75% from economically disadvantaged backgrounds	Offers adaptive accessible recreation, and focuses on helping individuals overcome challenges. Counselors are trained to meet individual needs with personal care, emotional, behavioral and social support.
<a href="#"><u>Happy Hollow Camp</u></a> Nashville, IN – serves Indianapolis region <i>United Way of Central Indiana</i>	93% from economically disadvantaged backgrounds	Develops problem-solving skills, self-sufficiency, teamwork, leadership and decision-making capabilities. Challenges children to transfer skills learned at camp to everyday life. Counselors are trained to support campers’ positive behaviors and social skills.

Builds skills and enthusiasm for reading, math and STEM: alumni break the cycle of poverty.</p>
<p><a href="#"><u>Wyman</u></a> Eureka, MO – serves St Louis region</p>	<p>100% from economically disadvantaged backgrounds</p>	<p>Offers summer experiences that are integrated into a progressive program from 6<sup>th</sup> grade through college to support, inspire and prepare teens to break the chains of poverty as adults. Counselors are trained in adolescent needs and behavior management.</p>
